# Library Resources

## Thingdom: Library of Things



The Thingdom is the library's lending library of things. These items help support the library's mission to provide a variety of information and materials to support curiosity, free inquiry, and life-long learning.

If you are looking for an item, but it is too expensive to purchase, or you would only need to use it once, the Thingdom is a great place to check and see if you can borrow it for free.

# Thingdom: Lending Guidelines

1. Thingdom loan periods vary by item however the majority of items circulate for one week.
2. There will be no renewals allowed for Thingdom items due to high demand.
3. Thingdom items can not be placed on hold.
4. Thingdom items will not be shared via delivery with other libraries. All items are borrowed from and returned directly to the Milne Public Library.
5. Thingdom items need to be returned to the Circulation Desk during the library's open hours. Some items may take 24-48 hours to check in from your account.
6. All items must be returned in the same condition as issued, barring normal wear and tear.
7. The patron agrees to pay for the loss or theft of or damage to any item and further agrees to accept the library's assessment of condition and assessment of fair restitution for damage, dirtiness, delinquency, and/or loss of items in part or in total. This restitution amount could equal up to the full replacement cost of the item.
8. The library reserves the right to refuse the loan of any item at its discretion.

You must have a library card to check out items from the Thingdom. Cards can belong to any libraries within the CWMars system. # Technology

Here at the David and Joyce Milne Public Library, we offer a variety of options to suite all your tech needs.

## Printing and Copying



The library has a printer available for public use, situated next to the public computers near the Reference Desk. The printer is capable of printing in both black & white and color.

Black and white printouts cost \$0.10 per sheet.

Color printouts cost \$0.20 per sheet.

You can also send documents to our printer from your phone, tablet or PC.

If you need to make any black and white or colored copies of a document, we have a copier available for public use at the back of the library, opposite the public computers.

Copies are free with a cap of 50 copies for black/white and 25 copies for colored.

## Computers and Headphones



Public computer access is available. There are three desktops found near the printer and copying machine. These may be used for two hours at a time. If you do not have a library card, you can sign up for one or use a guest pass that allows you to access the computer for an hour.

Chromebooks for in-house use can be found at the front of the library near the Circulation Desk and headphones can be requested if you need to listen to audio.



## Wi Fi and Hotspots

Wi-Fi is available and free to use at the library.

You can borrow the internet from the library by checking out one of our Wi-Fi hotspots!



With a hotspot, you can connect to Wi-Fi using your personal devices wherever T-Mobile has coverage.

Hotspots are available at the front desk of the library.

- You need a library card to be able to borrow a hotspot.
- You must be at least 17 years old to borrow a hotspot.
- Hotspots can be checked out for two weeks.
- Hotspots cannot be placed on hold. Please come in and ask at the front desk if you would like to borrow one.
- There are no late fees, but Wi-Fi connections will be terminated once a hotspot is overdue.
- The fine for loss or damage is \$80.
- Filtering is turned on by default. You can request that filtering is turned off when you check out a hotspot. The library will not ask for a reason.
- Please return hotspots to the front desk of the library, not the drop box by the door.

## Thingdom Technology

Why buy new technology when you can borrow?

# Meeting Rooms

Some information to keep in mind when booking a meeting room:

- Meeting facilities of the library are available on a first-come, first-served basis, provided that such meetings do not conflict with library-sponsored programs.
- Because library rooms are in demand, advanced reservations are encouraged.
- A responsible adult member of the group needs to fill out the application.
- Finally not all requests can be granted. You will receive a notification when your request is approved.

# Seed Library

Our library offers a free seed library during the growing months (March - October).

Seed libraries are dedicated to supporting communities to steward their seeds and our connection to each other and the food that nurtures us.

Garden beds are located in the library's courtyard where the gazebo is located.



# Remedy Hall

Remedy Hall is a community supported mutual aid center in Williamstown, MA providing those experiencing hardship with non-food, basic life necessities free of charge.

The David and Joyce Milne Public Library is happy to be a satellite location for Remedy Hall.

There are two locations within our library that you can find items free of charge; upfront by our water fountain and in our Teen Room.

Remedy Hall is located at 620 Main Street in Williamstown, MA, two doors west of Ace/Aubuchon Hardware. Parking and accessible entrance is in the back.

They ask that patrons make appointments. Their hours are Monday through Friday 1 to 4pm.

## Youth Resources

### Williamstown Youth Center

The Williamstown Youth Center is a non-profit corporation located in Williamstown, Massachusetts, dedicated to providing quality recreational programs and activities for youths in grades 1-12.

Their mission is to nurture the recreational, social, and emotional well-being of youth in Williamstown and its surrounding communities through quality programs for all.

They accomplish this in a safe and enjoyable environment led by positive role models who provide and adapt programs and activities based on the needs of the community.

Programs include:



**FEMPOWER:** Connects Williams College female-identifying student-athletes with 4th-6th grade female students in Williamstown to explore topics related to

health, nutrition, and wellness while creating bonds and allowing for a great mentorship opportunity. The program is designed to give young girls the skills, knowledge, and confidence to lead healthy lifestyles and to have fun learning to run a 5k while doing so.



**Youth Camps:** 4 Days (weekly rate or daily rate available) at the Youth Center 8-5:30 PM April 22nd - 25th. Enrollment is open to first through eighth graders.



**Sports:** The Youth Center offers a variety of sports like soccer, swimming and diving lessons, basketball, skiing and snowboarding, lacrosse, & track and field.



**Arts and Theatre:** The Youth Center's arts programming fosters creative growth through innovative instruction in dedicated spaces. In addition

to daily, on-site visual art instruction in their After School Program, they offer dance classes and space for young musicians, writers, dramatists, and others to share their work and develop skills in a supportive and constructive environment.

Family Open Art Studio takes place in the WYC's large and fully stocked art room. Make use of serve-yourself art supplies, weekly themes and projects, and guidance from their art educator. A \$5 donation appreciated and all are welcome. Stay tuned for more information about when this program will resume.

**Scholarships:** The Youth Center is committed to making their programs and services available to all area families. For this reason, they provide need-based scholarships so that any child can afford to participate. The Youth Center is open from 8:00 am to 5:30 pm, Tuesday through Friday during February and April vacations. Join us for four days of on-site activities, indoor and outdoor play, and art activities. Please pack a lunch and two snacks for your child.

## Service Net

## Laundry Love

Laundry Love is a neighboring movement that partners with groups, schools and local laundromats to wash the clothes and bedding of low-income and/or no-income neighbors.

Laundry Love hosts 3.5 hour events at local laundromats and services are on a first come, first serve basis. Neighbors will be responsible for their clothing at all times and may not leave the premises during these events. Quarters, dryer sheets and soap are provided.

Each individual can wash 2 loads and each family can wash 5 loads (a family is defined as a parent/parents with children). A heaping laundry basket is about 2 loads of laundry.

Load size will be determined by the Laundry Love coordinators. You are encouraged to bring your bedding which will not be included in the load limits.

# Housing Resources

## Upside413

The mission of Upside413 is to develop opportunities that will assist Berkshire County households in securing the skills, knowledge, and resources necessary to achieve self-sufficiency and household stability.

Programs include:

**Berkshire Consumer Services Program (BCSP):** BCSP offers free and voluntary phone-based mediation and counseling services to consumers who have filed complaints regarding issues they have experienced with businesses.

**The Dispute Resolution Center:** Provides community-based and court-connected dispute resolution services to Berkshire County residents.

**Foreclosure Prevention Counseling:** Offers comprehensive Foreclosure Prevention Counseling to distressed homeowners in Berkshire County.

**Homeless and Unaccompanied Youth Program:** Supports individuals aged 18–24 in Berkshire County who are at risk of or experiencing homelessness.

**Housing and Legal Counseling:** Offers comprehensive Housing and Legal Counseling services to tenants, homeowners, and rental property owners throughout Berkshire County.

**Affordable Housing Programs:** Funded through HUD, the SRO (single room occupancy) is subsidized housing and follows section 8 guidelines for rent (roughly 30% of income).

**Housing Search Resources & Homelessness Diversion Services:** Dedicated to assisting individuals and families in Berkshire County who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

**Real Estate Dispute Resolution:** UpSide413 oversees the Dispute Resolution System (DRS), endorsed by the Berkshire County Board of REALTORS®, to settle real estate disagreements among buyers, sellers, and/or brokers. Please note that there is a fee associated with this service.

**Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF):** The outreach program aims to assist veterans and their families before they become homeless in New York State, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Western Massachusetts.

**Tenancy Preservation Program (TPP):** A homelessness prevention program. TPP works with individuals and families with disabilities that are facing eviction as a result of behaviors related to a disability.

# Williamstown Housing Authority

The mission of the Williamstown Housing Authority is to provide decent, safe, and affordable housing opportunities for low income families, elderly, and handicapped or disabled persons.

Programs include:

**Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers (HCV):** Federally funded vouchers for very low income people. The family finds the unit that must meet eligibility standards. Rent is based on the tenant's income, which must be within the HUD income limits. Tenants pay a minimum of 30% of their income for rent.

**Elderly/Handicapped Housing:** 30 units of state-funded housing. All units are one bedroom. Applicants must be 60 years of age or handicapped, and meet income eligibility guidelines. Tenants pay 30% of their income for rent, which includes heat, electricity, and water & sewer. Eligible and qualified applicants are selected in chronological order by date of application.

**Family Housing:** 8 units of state-funded family housing. There are 2,3,& 4 bedroom units. Applicants must meet income eligibility guidelines and pay 27% of their income for rent, which includes water & sewer. Tenants pay their own heat and electricity. Applicants are selected in chronological order by date of application.

**Mass. Rental Voucher Program (MRVP):** 16 project based state-funded units. Tenants are selected by the landlord and screened by the WHA. Applicants must meet income eligibility guidelines. Tenants pay 35% of their income for rent.

**Special Need Housing:** 8 units of state-funded housing for special need residents. Residents are referred to the house by the Department of Mental Health. The WHA does not select residents for this program. The home is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Programs include:

**Emergency Relief Fund:** This fund is provided by the Berkshire Taconic Foundation to offer emergency assistance to households struggling to make ends meet.

**Neighborhood Revitalization:** Driven to improve the quality of life in local neighborhoods Habitat empowers residents to lead projects they want to see.

**Volunteer Income Tax Assistance:** IRS-certified volunteers provide free, one-on-one tax return preparation with fast, electronic filing.

**Financial Tools:** Take control of your money and understand the hidden rules of finance. Habitat offers a free course with guest speakers from local banking institutions.

**Home Preservation:** They offer home repair services to qualifying homeowners so they can continue to live in safe, decent homes for years to come.

**Housing Services:** Their housing counselors can help you navigate through issues that could threaten your tenancy such as landlord and neighbor disputes, code violations, tenant and landlord rights.

# Transportation

## Bicycles

**Mohawk Trail Multi-Use Path:** The path runs parallel to the Hoosic River, and several miles from Syndicate Road to the end of the Spruces on Route 2. You can park on either end of the path. The trail is mostly paved, but consists of a rougher gravel path as you get closer to the Spruces.

**Berkshire Bike Path:** The Berkshire Bike Path is envisioned as a centralized shared use path "spine" that travels north to south through Berkshire County through the communities of:

- Williamstown
- North Adams
- Adams
- Cheshire
- Lanesborough
- Pittsfield
- Lenox
- Lee
- Stockbridge
- Great Barrington
- Sheffield

By staying close to the center of the county, the path will be able to avoid relatively steep terrain and ensure that people of all ages and abilities can use it.

**Rights and rules for cyclists in Massachusetts:** The statewide organization, MassBike, outlines the rules that cyclists and motorists in the state must follow, in addition to cyclists' rights. The rules were updated in 2023, so it's worth taking a look at.

## Buses

*(For travel within Berkshire County)*

**Berkshire Regional Transit Authority (BRTA):** Route 3 serves Williamstown. From North Adams, multiple other lines/routes are available as well.

Paper schedules are at the library, but please note the most up-to-date schedules are on the BRTA website. From Williamstown, tickets must be purchased with cash on the bus, or you can purchase a "Charlie Card" and other various passes in advance.

*(For traveling to and around Bennington County, Vermont)*

**Green Mountain Express:** The purple line stops in Williamstown four times a day, Monday-Friday. Paper schedules are available at the library as well as on the Green Mountain Express website. Tickets can be purchased with cash, or by using the Transit app on a smartphone.

*(For travel to major cities and airports)*

**Peter Pan:** The Peter Pan bus can take you to destinations all over Massachusetts, in addition to several major cities out-of-state. Peter Pan only stops in Williamstown on the weekends. From Williamstown, tickets must be purchased online in advance, or with cash on the bus (no change is provided). Schedules are only available online. Please note that fares out of Pittsfield tend to be substantially lower.

## Car Parking

There are a number of public parking options in Williamstown. The most central parking lot to many Williamstown amenities is located at the bottom of Spring Street.

## Car Rentals

There are no longer car rental options in North Adams or Williamstown. Multiple national rental companies have offices in Pittsfield, Bennington, and/or Albany, and may deliver a car to Williamstown for a fee.

## Taxis

*(Serving Northern Berkshire County)*

**RJ's Taxi:** RJ's only has a Facebook page online. Call (413) 346 - 4907 to schedule a ride. Might be the most dependable and economical taxi service in this area!

**Norm's Limo:** Norm's only has a Facebook page online. Call (413) 663 - 8300 to schedule a ride. Highly dependable!

**Transport the People:** Luxury shuttle service in the Berkshires, you can visit their website at [www.ttplimos.com](http://www.ttplimos.com) or call them at (800) 639 - 9605 or (413) 443 - 7111.

*(Ride-sharing services in Western Massachusetts)*

**Lyft or Uber:** Both services require the use of their apps on a smartphone. At this time, Uber is available some of the time for rides to and from Williamstown. However, rides with Lyft and Uber out of Williamstown are not always available since no drivers are based here.

## Trains


**Amtrak:** Amtrak provides service out of Albany to New York City, Buffalo, NY, Montreal and Boston, MA. Out of Pittsfield, Amtrak goes east to Boston. If the Berkshires is your destination between here and New York City, you can take the Berkshire Flyer from (and back to) the Moynihan Train Hall at Penn Station in NYC on weekends during the summer.


**Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA):** If you can get to Wassauc, NY, the MTA takes less than three hours to get to New York City from there, and is usually more economical than Amtrak.

The BHHL is for everyone, including LGBTQIA+, Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC), Deaf or hard of hearing, individuals with disabilities, and individuals whose first language is not English.

## How the Help Line Works:

1. Call, text, or chat for real-time clinical assessment, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.
2. You'll talk with a trained staff member who will assist you in accessing the treatment or support that meets your individual needs.
3. Connect with qualified professionals for mental health assessments, crisis services, substance use treatment, referrals and more, with options in your own community. Staff will remain on the line with you until you are connected to your next step.
4. Every call, text, or chat conversation includes clinical follow up to ensure your needs are met.
