Administrative and Staff Reports for May 14th Board Meeting

Library Director, Angela Zimmermann

We have some exciting news from the past month to share: we've been awarded the 2025 Sustainable & Resilient New England Library Grant in the amount of \$12,000! This grant, developed with the work of our Sustainability Committee in mind, will support one of our newest green initiatives - to bring Terracycle to our library.

TerraCycle is a global leader in innovative recycling solutions, dedicated to eliminating the idea of waste by finding ways to recycle materials that are not typically accepted through traditional curbside programs. Through this grant, we will be able to offer TerraCycle Zero Waste Boxes to the community, giving patrons the opportunity to responsibly dispose of hard-to-recycle items like snack wrappers, oral care products, K-Cups, and more.

In the coming months then, we'll be focused on implementing both the Sustainable & Resilient New England Library Grant (\$12,000) and the Libraries Transforming Communities Grant (\$10,000) which we've both received.

In other possibly even more exciting news, we've been informed that Laureyns United has received the new boilers. The installation date has not yet been scheduled but hopefully it'll be before winter! The temporary boilers have also been removed from the back courtyard. Again, thanks to Alex our Building & Grounds Supervisor and DPW for their work with this.

Building and Grounds

Various other building and grounds initiatives include:

- The new sign has been installed outside!
- We've been working with some of our amazing gardening volunteers who generously dedicate their time to keeping our grounds both sustainable and beautiful. We've been leaning heavily on their expertise to eventually introduce new signage for the front pollinator gardens thanks to Brianna, our Marketing & Communications Strategist for designing signs that align perfectly with our current branding. Patrons will be able to browse a folder, scan a code or link back to a dedicated page on our website to learn more.
- After speaking with Craig Clough, Head of DPW, I've been informed they are preparing to move forward with the window and door project in the near future.
- Mulch has already been delivered for the season and will be placed around the grounds.
- Sticks and brush piles will be removed soon as well. Thanks to Alex for his diligent care of the grounds!
- New locks were placed on the Thingdom door as well as the doors entering the Thingdom from both the staff room and the Board room.

Personnel

Nearly all performance evaluations have been completed and new goals have been set for the coming year.

I did end up making a reporting change within the organizational chart in that the Teen Librarian now reports directly to me.

We recently said goodbye to our Tech Time interns for the semester and extend our sincere thanks to Douglas Piñeda Gutierrez and Aunonto Rahman for their outstanding service. Their support was *sooo* deeply appreciated by the public. Douglas, who has been with us since last June, will be graduating from Williams College next month, and we wish him all the best. We'll stay in touch with Aunonto to see if he can return at some point, but we're also excited to welcome two new Williams students who will be joining us as summer interns.

We're also pleased to share that Val will continue with us through the summer as our Community Resource Services intern.

And a reminder that we are closed on Friday, May 16th for a staff in-service training day.

Pride Committee

The Town's Pride Committee has been meeting on a weekly basis and a couple of FYIs for the Board:

- The flag-raising will take place on Sunday, June 1st at 1:00 pm at Town Hall. After that, we will have a community picnic on our front lawn: food, music, lawn games, bouncy house, activities, etc. The library will be closed for browsing during this time, but staff and volunteers will be coming and going from the building to grab items we may need.
- On Sunday, June 8th at 1:00 pm, I will be opening the library from 1:00- 2:30 pm for a Drag Queen Story Hour. Staff and volunteers will be onsite to assist. Staff have also been equipped with prepared language in advance, in case we receive any questions or concerns about the reasons for offering this program.

Citizens' Academy

Our collaboration with the League of Women Voters and the Town of Williamstown to bring a Citizens' Academy to our Town officially kicked off on Wednesday, May 7th at 6:30 pm with the event "Who Does What": A Closer Look into Town Hall with Bob Menicocci, Town Manager. The second event will be on Tuesday, May 13th will be "The Whys and Hows" of our Annual Town Meeting with Elisabeth Goodman, Town Moderator.

(Town Manager Bob Menicocci, Polly Macpherson from the League of Women Voters, and I recorded a segment with Willinet to promote the events and explain the origins of the Citizens' Academy. However, we were informed a few days later that a user error occurred - the correct camera input was not selected after the shot was set. We couldn't get together to re-record before the events.)


We're already signed-up for the July 4th parade - so which of the Trustees will be walking with us? :)

- I attended the CW MARS Annual Circulation Meeting last Tuesday. A wide variety of circulation-related topics were discussed, including Library of Things, Blu Ray purchases, & patron privacy. It was an interesting discussion and I enjoyed having time to chat with my peers from other libraries in the network.
- I attended a collection development meeting at the beginning of the month. A variety
 of topics were discussed, mainly the fate of the lease books program, weeding, &
 genre-fication.

From the Adult Services Department: Adult Services Librarian, Kira Williams

In April almost all of our growing number of recurring programs experienced steady or increased attendance numbers. The only exception to that is the Board Game group with Steve Kurzban, so he has decided to have his last session in June. Even though we switched the date to Saturday, he has not had enough people attend to make it worth his while.

Of the one-time events, three were about gardening to complement the new seed library (which is still seeing decent traffic). Seed Savers Exchange presented virtually about getting started with seeds, and Sharon Wyrrick, retired founder of Many Forks Farm, provided two workshops. One was for beginner gardeners and the other was a discussion group for all gardeners. While attendance was low, interest was high. She donated her time and may even be interested in coming back a few times during the growing months.

Rocio and I again hosted Poetry Open Mic Night, with Chris Hantmann, a local poet, MCing again. Those who were there had a lot of fun. About six people read poems, and twelve people attended in total. Related to that, a wide range of repetitive, and very creative, poems were submitted and displayed in our poetry "gallery" in the Community Room.

I also received more volunteer applications and trained several shelvers as well, so we now have a full slate of volunteers, including a new taker for a shift on Saturdays! Our enthusiastic, dedicated volunteers never cease to amaze me.

The sustainability committee met again too. Great news - we won the grant in the amount of \$12,000 to purchase Zero Waste Boxes from Terracycle! We're also looking forward to the Get Energized Williamstown! event in May, a tabling event in partnership with Energize Williamstown, and starting a regular sustainability discussion group in the near future. We will meet again in May, and hope to continue to meet monthly.




Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee, Brianna Christie

During the month of April, the DEI Committee met twice, April 1st and April 15th. Our April 1st meeting discussed growing needs we have collectively noticed from patrons in the library, these being food and financial insecurity. The committee also discussed ways in which we can hold our work "accountable" and make these initiatives known, not only to our library staff and patrons, but the Williamstown community as a whole.

In our April 1st meeting, based on our discussion surrounding food insecurity, we began brainstorming a "Free Little Pantry" at the Milne. This initiative is still in the developmental phase, and we are going to launch it in May. Thanks to the generosity of Remedy Hall, we have been given a mini fridge that will be housed in the front satellite location of the hall.

During National Library Week (after our April 1st meeting) we launched two "White Board 'Talk Backs" for patrons to answer questions surrounding belonging in the library (see below). We got great responses which will help us as a committee in the future.





Lastly, we have launched our first quarterly committee report (see attached). The report will allow for more transparency and accountability for the important work we are doing. The report highlights updates, grant application & awards, initiatives, and more that happened in the previous four months.




Work continued on refining the July/August summer reading calendar in preparation for our visit to WES and it's finally ready for printing. More info on that next month.

Poetry Month is one of our favorite months of the year. Our library-wide poetry month challenge this year was to create a Repetitive Poem. Patrons picked up a packet at the library that included an explanation of Repetitive Poetry, examples by established poets (and Homer Simpson!), and writing prompts to get the creative juices flowing. Over 70 poetry packets were distributed throughout the month, including 20 packets that were delivered to Mt. Greylock Regional School English and Spanish language departments. The returned poems were entered into a prize drawing and will be displayed in the Community Room through the month of May. I will include final stats on returned poems in May.

Within the Teen Room we had two displays featuring poetry collections and novels written in verse.

late evening event and our next spanish storytime will take place on a Saturday afternoon which we hope will be a better time for more families.

Afterschool snacks were as popular as ever with over 100 teens participating throughout the month!

During the Spring Break vacation, I hosted the 3rd installment of Friendship Bracelets for kids, parents and teens. It was a very popular craft! Participation included 9 teens/tweens; 25 kids and 18 adults. We made around 90 bracelets and many necklaces as well! I also hosted a showing of the Disney film in English and Spanish. 18 attendees enjoyed this fun film and our brand new popcorn machine.

Building & Grounds Supervisor, Alex Charron

The propane heaters and tanks have been removed and repairs to the damaged areas of the courtyard has begun. I have started fixing the damage caused by the propane trucks and the equipment used to install and remove them (lots of divots in our grass/grounds).

New locks have been installed on all entry doors to the Thingdom, also the lock in the entry door to the back vestibule has been repaired.

The hole left by the removal of the air conditioning unit in the main circulation area has been repaired and repainted as well as various other areas of touch-up painting.

Patt's Disc Repair Station has been put back in order in the west wing. This was displayed due to the temporary heating solution.

The new library sign has been installed and the old posts have been removed.

We have received our yearly delivery of mulch which will be placed weather-permitting.

A new filter was also installed in the water fountain.

Aside from that it has been mostly business as usual with daily requirements and set-ups and clean-ups from our programs.
